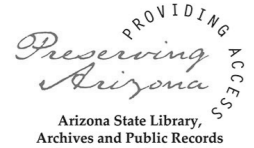

OPEN HOUSE 2025: CELEBRATING 55 YEARS OF SERVICE

On March 14, 2025, the Arizona Talking Book Library opened its doors for the first in-person Open House since 2017. Approximately 230 visitors walked through the library during a very busy morning. We were touched to learn that some patrons traveled long distances to join us that day, with one person coming all the way from Somerton - which is a 3 hour commute!

Attendees toured the building to find out more about each department, and to learn how book orders are assigned and put onto cartridges to mail all over the state. The fun didn't stop there, as our patrons then had the opportunity to choose their own adventure. In the new upstairs training space, they listened to special guest speakers throughout the day. As an example, we were honored to welcome Kevin Osborne, Head of the Network Services Section at the National Library Service for the Blind and Print

Disabled (NLS), who journeyed west from Washington, DC! He did not come empty-handed, and some lucky patrons were among the first to hold the next generation digital player, known as the DA2. And where did they go to try it out? At the Device Advice table, where staff from the Arizona Talking Book Library and Saavi Services for the Blind answered questions about library equipment like the Braille eReader.

Other organizations exhibited at the event, including Maricopa County Elections, who were on hand to demonstrate accessible voting equipment and ballots.

Wolf Hall by Hilary Mantel

Thomas Cromwell, a closet Protestant and blacksmith's son who becomes advisor to Henry VIII of England, realizes that he can accumulate power and wealth by assisting the king in obtaining an annulment and simultaneously help commoners and his country by destroying the corrupt Catholic clergy. Booker Prize. **DB 70074**

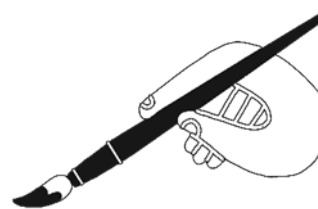

Audio Magazine Updates

The following audio magazines will be available soon on the BARD downloading service or on digital cartridge. Subscribe today!

Fur Fish Game (Monthly): Covers a variety of outdoor pursuits.

National Geographic History (Bimonthly): Explores more than 5,000 years of people and places, from Caesar to Napoleon, the Pyramids to the Parthenon, and more.

Stereophile (Monthly): Covers high-end options for the audiophile.

Writer's Digest (Bimonthly): A resource that celebrates the writing life and publishing.

In addition, the audio recording and production of *The Economist* will resume in spring. Back issues from December 7, 2024 to current will not be available.

Braille Magazine Updates

Eight new braille magazines are being added to the NLS collection. These titles are only available in hard-copy braille and will not be on BARD. Call the library to sign up!

Aphra (Monthly): Dating, beauty and fashion advice for women.

Good Vibrations (Monthly): News and reviews of vinyl records and music equipment.

Missy (Monthly): Pop culture magazine for teenagers with gossip and interviews.

Piano Tuner's Quarterly (Quarterly): Advice and tips, and news from the industry.

Progress (Monthly, Grade 2 contracted or Grade 1 uncontracted): Current events, science, games, short stories, and seasonal (metric-system based) recipes.

Pure (Monthly): Articles on relationships, beauty, fashion, and celebrity interviews.

Shaping Up (Monthly): Health news, fitness features, and more.

In addition, *Stone Soup* in braille format will no longer be produced by NLS.
